The Covid-19 pandemic is a new set of experiences for everyone in our community. The Historical Society would like you to share yours with us so future generations can understand what regular, everyday people thought, felt, and did to make it through this time.

We've started with these questions...

How are you and your family spending your days? What are the challenges and how are you coping with them?

#### Here are some early responses:

"My wife is tele-subbing a 5th grade class. Although she is retired after a long teaching career and the work is endless, she is grateful to have something to organize her days and to give her purpose. Our biggest challenge is separation from our children and grandchildren. FaceTime helps, but we've missed a giant family trip to Disney World, Easter and three birthdays. Right now, it's hard to know how and when we'll be able to be together again. Technology is great, but it's not the real thing."

"I am the self-nominated grocery shopper and we have all taken turns with the cooking. We eat dinner as a family every night, which was more sporadic before the pandemic. The first week or two was the most challenging, because we had to adjust to a slower pace of life and resign ourselves to the idea that life was not going to resume as normal any time soon. We all look forward to the day when we can get haircuts, buy multiple rolls of paper towels, go out to dinner, and hang out in person with our friends. Most of all, we count our blessings that we are healthy and still employed."

"As essential workers, my husband and I go to work each day. I am a window clerk at the Post Office and Charles cooks in a day care center set up for children of essential workers. It certainly helps to have our usual routine in these unusual times.

"I have a Plexiglas barrier, gloves and a mask since I work directly with the public at less than the six foot allowance. I have no idea who is infected and that is frightening. Charles is usually the only one in his kitchen although at least twelve others are in the facility.

"We both are glad to be of use, have paying jobs and assisting with keeping America going and pray for continued health and strength."


