f. Is there any information on Port Chester in the 1950s, 1960s, and 1970s? We hope to answer these questions in our next newsletter!



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
# WATER DAMAGE AT THE BUSH-LYON HOMESTEAD

#### ARTS COLLABORATION OPPORTUNITY! PORT CHESTER WORDS INTO MUSIC

The Port Chester Historical Society is helping Pam Sklar, a local artist, with an upcoming ArtsWestchester-funded project called Words into Music, Part 2 [the first part was about Mount Vernon]. She interviews people and then uses those conversations to help her compose music that reflects the experiences of the interviewees - this is done through the music itself, not through lyrics.

The interviews are NOT about history, but about the individual. Sklar writes, "This could include a positive or difficult experience past or present, a special memory, an event, childhood moments, a beloved or influential person or teacher (current or from long ago) or about a personal transition, anything poignant, or a family situation."

Pam is interested in talking informally with people from all walks of life, all ages (from students to seniors) from the Port Chester/Rye Brook/Rye Town community.

The musical composition will be performed in Port Chester/Rye Brook in March of 2023. It will be free and open to the public and everyone is invited!

Details about the interviews/conversations:

- All interviewees will remain anonymous.

- They will take place in person at a neutral venue or over the phone.
- Length: 20 min 1 hour.
- Timing: from July 19th and through the end of September.
- Scheduling will be set up in advance.

# HISTORICAL SOCIETY TRUSTEE NORM DAVIS DESCRIBES 1900: The Remarkable Mystery of Charles Seymour Bulkley, Sr.

Charles S. Bulkley was born 1825 at Port Chester, the son of Gershom Bulkley and Mary Emeline Bush, (daughter of Gilbert Bush) of the Bush Homestead on King Street. He became a Civil Engineer, and served as Chief of the United States Signal Service in the Civil War. In 1864 he was sent to San Francisco as a company representative for the Western Union Telegraph Company to organize the US Western Union Telegraph Expedition, 1865-1867. The expedition was to survey a route for, and to construct, a telegraph line between the United States and Europe by way of British and Russian America, Bering Strait, and Siberia. His maps and detailed log books are on file at the Smithsonian Museum in Washington, DC.

When Charles left Port Chester to join the Civil War he left behind a young wife Julia Palmer. After a time, his letters ceased, and she assumed him dead. In fact, no one in Port Chester heard from him for 40 years. Only Charles's lawyer, Hanford Henderson of Port Chester, knew him to be alive and prospering in California, building railroads and public works, and amassing a fortune with engineering projects in Mexico and Central America. He also married the daughter of a California mine owner shortly after the war, without obtaining a divorce from Jane, and had two children: Charles S. Bulkley, Jr. and Howard Bulkley.

Henderson knew all of this, and invested Bulkley's money and handled his properties. Bulkley drew up a Will while in Guatemala, and left his entire estate to his "second" wife Abbie Dexter, valued at over \$100,000 in 1890. That Will was sent to Henderson about 1892. Port Chester residents were shocked to learn that Charles had survived the Civil War. And almost immediately it became clear that more than half of Bulkley's fortune was missing when his son Howard leveled charges against Henderson, when he could not produce records of the estate. It was further found that Henderson's son Herbert was living in a house in Port Chester that belonged to Bulkley, rent free, without taxes paid.

Mary Emeline Bulkley hired Frederick W. Clark to investigate. Mr. Clark discovered that 26 lots belonging to the Bulkleys had been sold in Port Chester by Mr. Henderson, who kept all the proceeds.

Mary passed away in 1893 and the issue of who would inherit the Bush/Lyon Estate and all its properties took on some urgency. The descendants of Mary's father Gilbert Bush's brothers and sisters, who believed they would be heirs to the property, are forced to contest the will in court. At issue is Gilbert Bush's will, giving the entire estate (originally 400 acres) to his wife and their daughter Mary E. Bulkley, and no others; Mary E. Bulkley died supposedly with no living heirs - until news of Charles is published. Mary "had many children but buried them one by one...." Gilbert Bulkley, the last of her children, died when Mary was 94 years old. Henderson insists that Gilbert (who apparently drank himself to death after his wife and their two children died) allowed the estate to be divided up into lots and sold, leaving Mary with nothing. Her closest relatives, the Merritts, Wetmores, and Bushes, contest the Will in Henderson's possession. Thus began a long drawn-out series of court orders and investigations, concluding at last that in fact, there was virtually no estate left in Mary's name.

Mary's father Gilbert Bush was the son of Abraham Bush and Ruth Lyon. Gilbert's brother Abraham also lived in the King Street house with his family. William (1781-1856), his son, inherited the house and kept it in the family until the death of his son Hobart, in 1925. The property passed to the Village of Port Chester shortly thereafter although even during Hobart's life the house was being shown, and used, as a historic property.

#### FLOWERS FROM THE HOMESTEAD GARDENS




