PORT CHESTER-RYE NAACP RECOGNIZES KIKKI SHORT



On Sunday, October 22, 2023, at the Port Chester/Rye NAACP Freedom Fund Luncheon, Kikki Short, Director of the Port Chester Historical Society (and the energy behind many historical society projects) was recognized by the Port

Chester/Rye NAACP for her work with the Port Chester Historical Society, "in honor of your commitment to our history and our future." The keynote speaker was United States Congressman Jamaal Bowman; the theme was



"Celebrating Our History and Our Future."



Deputy Mayor of the Village of Port Chester Joan Grangenois-Thomas introduced Kikki, who was presented with a "Freedom History

Champion Award" from branch president Tom Kissner. In addition, she received proclamations of achievement from the United States Congress, the State Senate of New York, the State Assembly of New York, the Westchester County Legislature, and

even the Village of Port Chester.

October 26th, 2023 was declared Kikki Short Day in Westchester County and her name was displayed on the Jumbotron in front of the Westchester County Center in White Plains. *Congratulations*, *Kikki!*

VR AT THE GHNN CONFERENCE A First for the Bush Lyon Homestead!

On October 24, the Greater Hudson Heritage Network (GHHN) Conference included the work of REX2 at its annual conference at Boscobel House and Gardens in Garrison, NY. REX2, a design and

real-estate development company with the goal of providing cutting-edge realestate technology to developers, "practiced" their software by creating a complete scan of the Bush Lyon Homestead. The scan of the Homestead can be accessed at this link on the Historical Society web page:

Visitors at the GHHN conference were able to virtually walk through the Bush-Lyon Homestead using virtual reality headsets - a FIRST for us! The



Port Chester Historical Society has never before had visitors who were nowhere near Port Chester "walk" through the building. Because the walk

through is in virtual reality, visitors could go into spaces that are not generally accessible to the public, such as the low eaves in the attic or the spaces around the original colonial chimney. We hope to make this experience available to many more people as time goes on.





There are many rumors that the Bush Lyon Homestead, which dates to about 1760, is *haunted*! Many families with children ate, slept and played in this house until 1990. Is a spirit living in this house - or in one of the old dolls in the Homestead's collection?

The Society ran a "Creepy Doll Contest" before Halloween. Posted on the Society web site were the doll heads of five of the Homestead's creepiest dolls. Web visitors were asked to virtually vote for which they thought was the creepiest of all. The contest winner was Sophia Castro, shown here with her creepy choice, which she also got the privilege of naming "Creepy Molly."

Our mission: to help us believe in each other by illuminating the humanity and possibility in us all — one story at a time. Since our founding in 2003, we've helped nearly 700,000 people across the country have meaningful conversations about their lives. These recordings

are collected in the U.S. Library of Congress and in our online archive which is now the largest single collection of human voices ever gathered." LISTENING AND DISCUSSION GROUP How Did We Get Here?

We are very excited to announce that we are hosting a "Reading and Discussion Group" funded by a grant from Humanities New York. Our series is called "How Did We Get Here" and is based on listening to and then discussing a podcast entitled Amended., "a podcast series from Humanities New York, travels from the 1800s to the present day to show us a quest for women's full equality that has always been as diverse, complex, and unfinished as the nation itself." We aim to connect the struggle for women's equality to other struggles for equality, including the immigrant experience, which has always been a part of life in Port Chester. As HumanitiesNY notes, "Most Americans learn one, specific version of the history of woman suffrage: that a few bold, white women led a movement for equal voting rights and achieved victory 100 years ago, when the United States ratified the 19th Amendment. That, we're told, enabled all American women to vote. But history is never as simple as the stories we tell about it. After that historic milestone, more women could cast a ballot than ever

before, and yet the fight for women's equal voting rights was, and still is, far from over. *Amended* travels from the 1800's through to the present day to show us a quest for women's full equality that has always been as diverse, complex and unfinished as the nation itself."

The podcast is in six parts, each about 45 minutes long. It manages to be both accessible to the general public and to include plenty of in-depth historical information. Our discussions will happen three times and each will be focused on two podcast episodes. Be prepared to learn a LOT and to engage your neighbors!

BRIDGE REPLACEMENT

Two bridges on the Port Chester-Greenwich border that span the Byram River will soon disappear. Both bridges are going to be replaced for flood mitigation. Historical Society Director Mike




DiVittorio, in a video on the Society Facebook page, explains that the current bridges replace a wooden bridge which spanned the Byram River in the mid-18th century. The current Putnam Avenue bridge was built in 1888, while the Hillside Avenue stone



bridge was built in 1926. They will be replaced by concrete bridges. The Historical Society is attempting to work with Westchester County governments to save the two memorial markers that were installed when the stone bridges were built. The Putnam Avenue

bridge has a stone marker, while the Hillside Avenue bridge has a bronze plaque.





